In more cases than not, it's a top-down process that goes something like this: 1.) The Pastor gets a vision for the church through prayer, Bible-reading, or the latest church leadership conference; 2.) the Pastor communicates the vision to the leadership, who support it; and 3.) the Pastor preaches about the vision to the congregation, who also support it.

One of the problems of this process is it doesn't include the dreams and visions of the church members, and it doesn't take into account their gifts, passions, and things they enjoy doing. Consequently, people don't get behind the proposed program or ministry, which leads to frustration, resentment, and a sense of failure in the Pastor.

I have also bought into a glass-half-empty mentality that tells me we can't do something because of our limitations, the two most common ones being limited human resources and limited finances.

But what if I looked at the glass as half-full instead of half-empty? What might I see? And what if I let go of the responsibility (entitlement) of discerning the vision for the congregation, and instead, empowered the congregation to do it for itself? What if my role was more to affirm the gifts and passions of the church members? What if, instead of casting (dictating) the vision, I facilitated the congregation's discernment of its own mission? And what if the process was fun? And what if it took no more than an hour after a church potluck?

I hope I have your attention. Stay tuned; there's more to come! I'm looking forward to what God has in store for us! 2018 is going to be a good year! I can feel it in my bones!

## **Rev. Elder Darlene Garner Retires**



With gratitude for her long fruitful and faithful service, Metropolitan Community Churches announces the retirement of Reverend Elder Darlene Garner from the staff of MCC, effective January 1, 2018. She also retired her active clergy credentials on the same day. At this time, all concerns regarding her role on denominational staff are mutually resolved between Rev. Elder Garner and MCC.

Rev. Elder Garner was the first African-American to serve on the MCC Board/Council of Elders and the only person of African descent to have served on the Senior Leadership Team. She continues to serve on the Council of Elders.

Rev. Elder Garner gained her clergy credentials in 1988, was first elected to the Board of Elders in 1993, and had served as MCC staff since 1999. Throughout her 29-year clergy career, she held numerous positions, which included being Associate Pastor of MCC Philadelphia, Pastor of MCC Baltimore, Senior Pastor of MCC of Northern Virginia, and Assistant District Coordinator for the former Mid-Atlantic District. She was also the Interim Pastor of Good Hope MCC in Cape Town (South Africa), a member of MCC General Council, Clerk and then Vice-Moderator of MCC, Judicial Officer, and Elder for Region 6 (Arizona, southern California, New Mexico, southern Texas, and Latin America).

In addition, she served on the Elders Task Force on Structures and Systems and the Elders Task Force on Education and was an MCC representative to two General Assemblies of the World Council of Churches (held in Brazil and South Korea). She is also the Founder and Convener of the MCC Conference for People of African Descent, Friends, and Advocates. MCC's Darlene Garner Institute for Ibero-American Leadership Formation was named in honor of her work in Latin America.

Most recently, Rev. Elder Garner served as Director of the Office of Emerging Ministries. In this capacity, she designed the Oasis Program through which individuals across the globe are now being touched by MCC's ministry, the Emerging Church Program that supports the development of new churches and church leaders in all parts of the world, and the Diversity and Inclusion Program. Among other things, the Diversity and Inclusion Program focuses primarily on the full inclusion within every part of MCC of bisexuals, heterosexuals, older adults, people living with HIV/AIDS, people of African descent, people of European descent working against racism, people with disabilities and differing abilities, transgender people, women, and young adults. It also focuses on resourcing churches to address both mental health and women's health.

The plans for her immediate future include gardening and sharing quality time with friends and family, especially with her wife Rev. Candy Holmes. As the founder of Garner Peace, she will conduct mediations and provide consulting services to individuals and organizations in the areas of diversity, leadership integrity, embracing change, strategic planning, and managing conflict.

## **Black History Month**



Black History Month is celebrated annually in the U.S. and Canada in February, as well as in the United Kingdom and the Netherlands in October. It is known as African-American History Month in the U.S. and Black Achievement Month in Canada, the United Kingdom and the Netherlands (as of 2016). It began as a way for remembering people and events in the history of the African diaspora.

David Mathis has this to say: “[W]e welcome Black History Month all the more, when racial tensions nationwide may be at a generational high, in the wake of the Ferguson unrest, viral videos of police brutality (or innocent officers being shot and killed), and a racially charged election cycle. Campaign 2016 repeatedly pushed racial buttons, not only for Mexicans and Muslims, but African Americans. And observances such as Black History Month, even though they can’t do all the work on their own, have a role to play in our healing as a nation.

“Into our racially charged environment, as we stumble forward to see if we will find any balance as we learn to walk under this president, Black History Month meets a need, and presents an opportunity not just for Americans, but followers of Christ.”


## **Becoming the Beloved Community by Understanding Racism**
